It was largely under the inspiration of your book, "The Key to Peace", that I undertook the preparation of a speech manuscript which is condensed in the enclosed booklet. Our mutual friend, Leonard Read, tells me that demand for the booklet is proving to be heavy, and that many letters and inquiries are arriving regarding various statements and opinions contained in it.
