Even though it looks like three colors, it is a two-color product as marked by your artist on his final art work. Personally, I like it much better than with the third "orange" color. But I did quote to you a price based on our absorbing the cost of a three-color product. In view of that, our invoice to you will be \$6.00 less than our quotation. That is what the third color would have cost us.
