



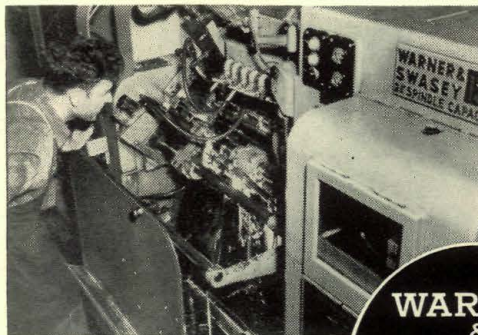
## Medals for millionaires
