Sir:

Orchids once again to Haslitt, who (Newsweek Jan 14) comes across with another of his incisive analyses of our foreign as well as domestic affairs.

While in general, Haslitt's presentations are completely unassailable because of their incontrovertible factual basis, of their unadornment with those sophistries other writers use to make their stuff palatable to the unheroic mind, we find this one especially noteworthy for its frank recognition of moral issues.

I refer to Haslitt's bringing out in stark reality the curious actions of our President, one supposedly deeply imbued with a sense of the moral, virtually condoning and subsequently encouraging the gangster Nasser in his commission of a criminal act, that of the brigandry of the Suez Canal.

Then, with an inconsistency, logically incomprehensible, calling on the World thru the United Nations, to build a moral political hegemony in the Middle East, using moral instead of military force, to erect the structure.

This, after the very sine qua non of the moral foundation of empire, the sanctity of contract of the Christian world, was destroyed for the unholy delight of the moslem and hindu worlds that have gloated over it ever since, by the Eisenhower-Dulles floundering indirection.

Is it any wonder therefor that this latest move of the Administration now being graced with the name of Eisenhower Doctrine, turns out on analysis to be one great masterpiece of ambiguity? It probably is better than: Stop the draft, and stop Atomic Testing, ~~etc~~ which surely is but the faintest of faint praise.
